Public Comments:

Mazie Goldstein of 142 Brickton Village Circle Fletcher commented on the excessive traffic on Old Brickyard and Old Hendersonville Road and also commented on the potholes at the entrance to their subdivision as well as all the trash on the road from the recycling center located across the road from their subdivision.

Approval for the ABC Board to adjust their working capital limit to \$1.5 million.

Discussion Items

Public hearing to consider potential amendments to Appendix 1 of the Fletcher Land Development Code (Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance).

Planning & Zoning Director Eric Rufa went over the proposed amendments to the Fletcher Land Development code pertaining to the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance. He then answered questions that the council had for him. He also stated that Mike Hensen and Chris Brown of McGill Associates are here for any questions as well.

Public hearing and approval of budget ordinance - Mark Biberdorf, Town Manager

Town Manager Mark Biberdorf gave a PowerPoint presentation (see attached) on the proposed budget for the upcoming FY 25/26. He then answered questions that the council had for him concerning the proposed budget.

Mayor Blakely asked for a motion to open the Public Hearing.

Mayor Pro-Tem Trevor Lance motioned to open the Public Hearing, and it was seconded by Councilmember Jim Player.

Mayor Blakely asked if anyone had any comments on the proposed budget for the upcoming FY 25/26.

There were no comments made at this time from anyone.

Councilmember Jim Player motioned to approve the budget ordinance, and it was seconded by Mayor Pro-Tem Trevor Lance.

Town Manager Report

Town Manager Mark Biberdorf stated that he talked to the council last week about the park repairs, and he is hoping that this will be wrapped up soon. Our Parks & Rec Director said that they are closing off the multi-use courts so that they can finish the fencing. The ball fields are nearing completion this week. Then the last thing is our stream bank and bridge repairs (bid out) as we did another addendum with McGill Associates for this project. We had to extend the deadline for bids but tomorrow is the bid opening for these repairs.

On our street resurfacing project, we got the last pay app on it, and we will be checking our punch list of items.

On the stormwater review in front of 96 Wilkie Way and the property behind that, I don't have anything from McGill yet, but any recommendation or analysis that I get on that I will share with you.

On the town center project, I mentioned that Martin Lews is interested in taking a run at this again. They are gathering information with their engineer (Will Buie WGLA) that they are working with, and they are meeting with McGill (our engineer) at the end of the week to go over an analysis of the property.

Last thing, I finally received a draft of our updated marketing document, and you have a hard copy in front of you. If you have any suggestions on this please let me know.

Town of Fletcher FY 2025-2026 Budget Presentation

June 9, 2025 Public Hearing

Budget Highlights

- The total recommended budget for the new fiscal year is \$9,995,316.
- This represents a moderate increase from the prior year budget of \$9,729,525.
- Increases in revenues are occurring primarily through additional property tax projections.
- Tax rate will remain at 28 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.
- Biggest increase in property tax values is from real values (land and buildings) at .62%.

Budget Highlights

- Largest increase in expenses is on the personnel side with the addition of a full-time Public Works Maintenance Specialist position.
- Also including a cost of living adjustment of 2.5% for all staff and merit pay within our performance evaluation system.
- Benefiting from a decrease in health insurance coverage costs – 5.2% *decrease* in premiums with no changes to plan.
- Inflationary factors necessitated a 3% increase in recycling costs with private hauler.
- Retail analysis and recruitment for Town Center project with continued marketing of property.

Budget Highlights

- Multiple capital needs are addressed through the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and in the Operating Budget.
- On the operating budget side, the Police Department will be purchasing and installing license plate reader cameras to assist with criminal investigations.
- Also on the operating side, Public Works will be purchasing a tire changer, cameras for the brush trucks, and a zero-turn riding mower.

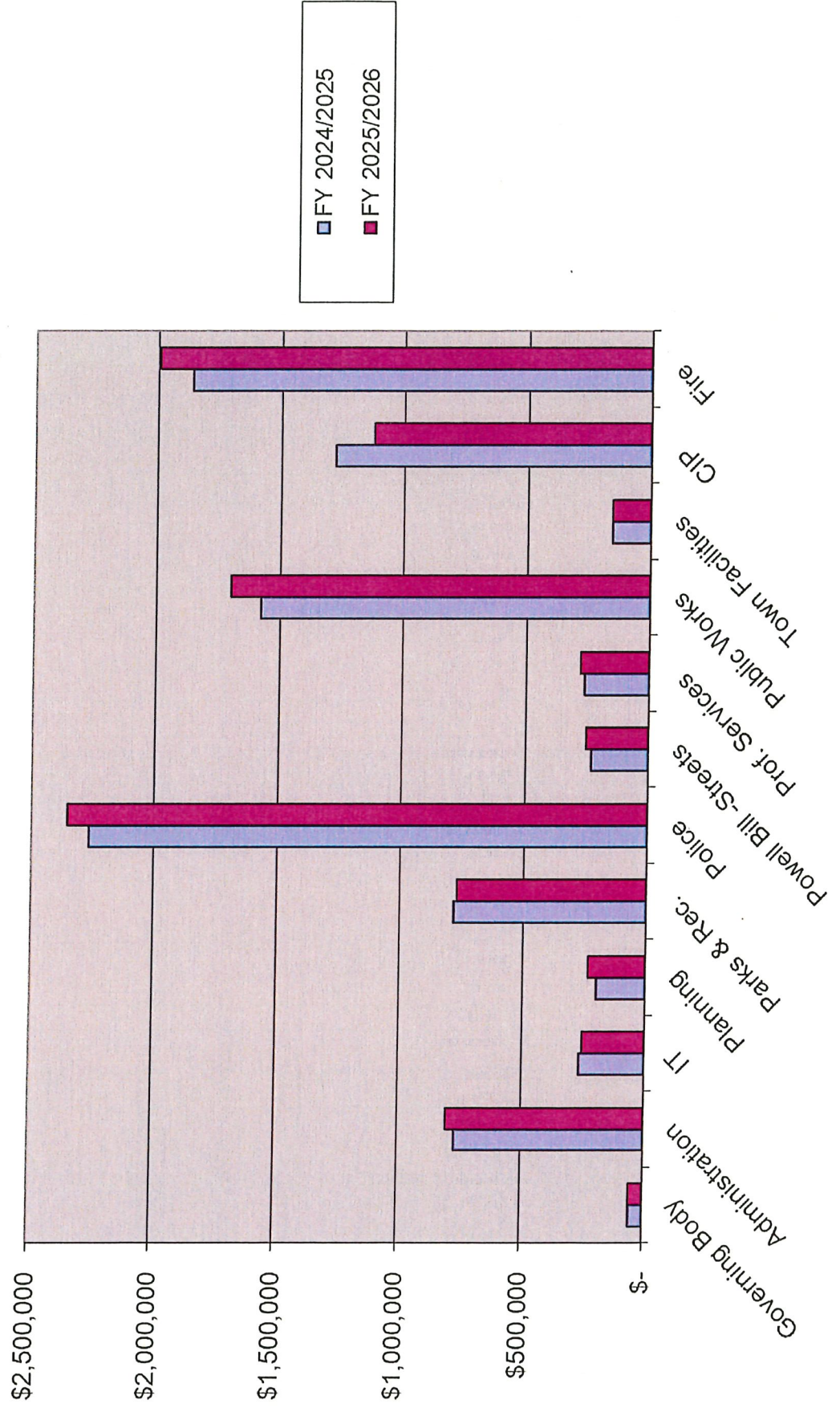
Implementation of Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)

- The capital improvement plan (CIP) is a five year plan that identifies major capital needs of the Town.
- 6 cents of the 28 cent tax rate will be dedicated to the CIP.
- 4 cents is dedicated to projects supported by debt service.
- The remaining 2 cents is dedicated for new projects that are paid with cash, or on a pay-as-you-go basis.

Annual Capital Budget for CIP

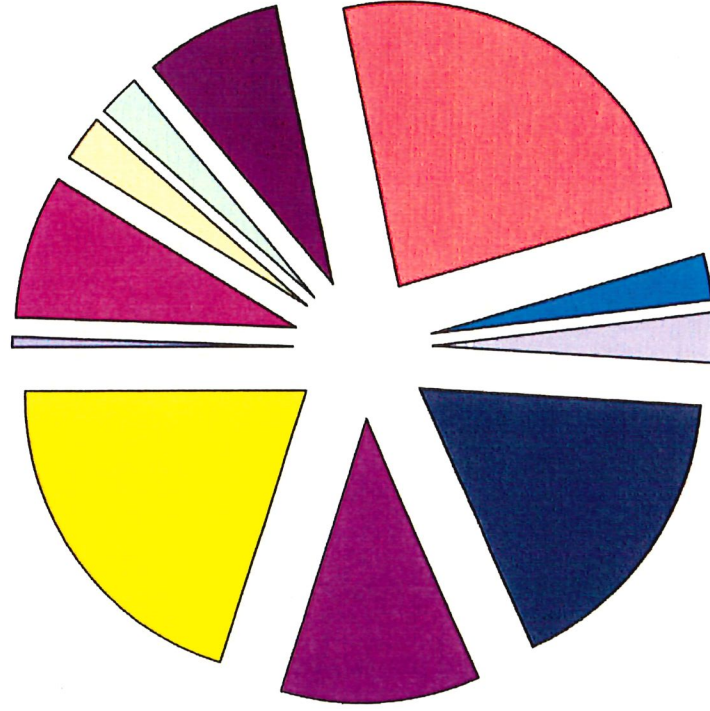
- Four projects are funded on the debt service side for this year -Town Hall Improvements, Highway 25 Land Acquisition, Copier Lease Payments, and Subscription Payments.
- Cash or pay-as-you-go projects for this year are: Police Vehicles (2), Cane Creek Greenway Extension, and Computer Workstation Replacements.

Departmental Comparison

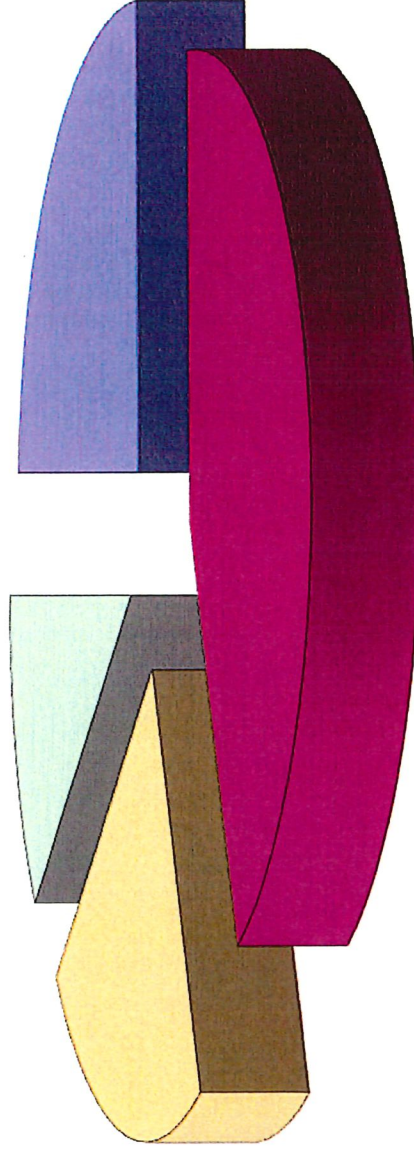
Dept. Comparison Amount Funded
